

/etc/sudoers files

/etc/sudoers controls who can use the `sudo` command and how it is used.

Whenever editing /etc/sudoers, the `visudo` command, which verifies the file before writing, should be used in order to prevent a situation where access to `sudo` is blocked.

Insults

Add or uncomment the following line if you want `sudo` to insult you if you get your password wrong:

```
Defaults insults
```

targetpw

The `targetpw` command will require that you enter the password of the user that you want to run the command as (typically `root`).

```
Defaults targetpw
```

This is enabled by default on openSUSE. I didn't like this behavior so I disabled it.

Allowing a group to use sudo

The following line will allow any user from the `wheel` group to use `sudo`.

```
%wheel ALL=(ALL:ALL) ALL
```

The `wheel` group is used by Fedora/openSUSE systems as the group whose members can use `sudo`. On Debian-based systems, the equivalent group is `sudo`.

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
